

## Our Sports Centres - “A History of Neglect and a Procurement Disaster”



### **The Dacorum Tories want to Privatise our Sports Centres Lara says the Tender Process was Flawed**

When Lara Pringle went to the Dacorum Council Meeting on 17th January she felt her Liberal Democrat colleagues had done well in forcing the Council to reconsider their sports contract procurement. Not only did they have the support of Labour, but also of a few brave Tories.

#### **Protest from the Public**

Eight members of the public, all experts in sports management, spoke well and persuasively. One spoke of Sportspace’s work helping disadvantaged groups, another of their nationally recognised success in developing participation in sports and a third of the company’s strong public service ethos.

Sportspace themselves reminded people how the supporting grant from Dacorum had come down from £1.4m to £250,000 a year, how they had attracted £5.3m of external funding that Dacorum was unable to access while also re-investing £8m.

#### **Protest from Councillors**

Opposition councillors said that the re-tendering was unnecessary, the value had not been demonstrated and the specification failed to take account of Sportspace’s financial success, their development work, their community involvement, and their public service ethos.

They also said the evaluation scheme for the tenders in practice gave far more weight to finance than the 40% factor claimed by Dacorum.

The tender did not allow for a fair scoring of

Sportspace’s good safety record and didn’t recognise any community benefits at all.

Moreover, the Tories were ignoring the odd corporate structure of the successful bidder, which shows a trading company within the private sector group being somehow registered as a charity. This is a risky tax strategy which could turn into a serious expense if disallowed by the authorities in the future.

#### **Tory Vote to Ignore Protest Despite Split**

However, Lara became increasingly dismayed by the stubborn attitude of the majority Tory councillors. None of the points made by any of the opposing councillors was really addressed, let alone accepted - so when it came to a vote she was not surprised that 24 Tories voted against reviewing their earlier decision and the opposition proposal was voted down despite 10 votes in favour.

This shows that the Lib Dems were quite justified in calling this decision back to the Council for debate. Their arguments resulted in 3 Tories voting against their party and won support from the one Independent plus Labour.

In addition there was a very high number of Tory abstentions and absences. They are split on the issue and the result also means that this policy is supported by fewer than half of the DBC councillors.

#### **Lara’s Comments**

Lara said afterwards, “This procurement process is **completely opaque**. Key financial details are hidden from the public. One Tory councillor actually said that she’d vote on figures that she’d seen - but she couldn’t tell us what they were!

“It is also **flawed**. Initially Dacorum only got one bidder - Sportspace - but then they extended the tender period rather than negotiate. It also looks as though the specification might have been set up to exclude Sportspace.

“Finally, we need to know where the capital is to come from for the much needed repair and refurbishment. The buildings in Berkhamsted and Tring have been badly neglected for some time and promised refurbishment is delayed over and over again.

“This is a disastrous procurement process and something I am determined to help to expose.”

## “No Lockfield houses before New Road Traffic is sorted out!”, says Lara



**Lockfield**, off New Road is being considered for development after 2031, though this could be earlier. At the moment it is railway land and provides access to the track from a public road. As such it is infrequently used and generates very little traffic. In the left hand picture you can see Lara Pringle discussing the matter with her Lib Dem colleague, Tring County Councillor, Nick Hollinghurst. They both agreed that residential development would result in significantly more traffic to and from the site - and on a daily basis.

Lara explained to Nick that there are huge traffic issues in Northchurch in general with New Road now taking far more traffic than ever before. The narrow bridge acts as a chicane but does not always slow the traffic down. Sometimes traffic actually speeds up to cross the bridge before someone else.

Lara feels that New Road and the High Street are both part of the same problem. She said, “I very much support the group campaigning for 20 mph speed restrictions, but I feel it should include New Road and start near the junction with Bridgewater Hill.”

She continued, “Personally I feel that the site is completely unsuitable for housing. I certainly

wouldn’t want to live so close to a high speed rail line. However the government has drastically reduced planning restrictions recently and so it is now much easier to get permission to build on Previously Used Land - which Lockfield clearly is.

But if Dacorum Borough Council - which is our local Planning Authority - does ever grant permission, then I would look to the developer to make a significant contribution towards road safety in Northchurch - a mini roundabout at the site entrance, traffic calming on New Road and the High Street and speed tables at each of the crossing points.”

She concluded, “But whatever is decided we can’t wait till 2031 for our 20 mph zone in Northchurch!”



## Lara Pringle is also Standing for Northchurch Parish Council
